1. Select a Goal

Goal: I want to know exactly when and where my great grandfather was born.



4. Record What You Find

This is a lot of new info. How do I record my new data accurately so I can analyze it later?



Challenge: It's time-consuming to manually write ALL evidence (including conflicting evidence) accurately to parse out later.

5. Analyze Evidence

Is this correct information? Some of this information doesn't make sense or fit what I already knew.



- Direct evidence
- Indirect evidence
- Negative evidence




Challenge: Which records really belong to my family? Which ones don't?

6. Record Conclusions

I have a birth date and location. Now I can record my information accurately and collaborate with others.

Challenges:

- 1. How can I collaborate with others with what I've found?
- 2. How can I share with others what I've found without allowing them to change it?



Research Process Summary

- 1. Select a goal Is this a reasonable goal?
- 2. Determine a research plan How do I know where to search? How much experience do I need? How am I ever going to remember what I've done?
- 3. Perform searches How difficult are these sites to use?



Research Process Summary

4. Record what you find - Writing everything down is time consuming but I need everything until I can sort through it.



- 5. Analyze evidence Who's who in what I've found?
- 6. Record conclusions How can I collaborate with others?

- FamilySearch = 1750 (includes BillionGraves and FindAGrave)
- FindMyPast = 700
- FamilySearch FamilyTree = 300
- AmericanAncestors = 60
- NewspaperArchives = 10
